**THE OFFICIAL PROCEEDINGS OF THE REGULAR MEETING OF THE GERING CITY COUNCIL,
March 14, 2016**

A regular meeting of the City Council of Gering, Nebraska was held in open session on March 14, 2016 at 6:00 p.m. at Gering City Hall at 1025 P Street, Gering, NE. Present were Mayor Kaufman and Councilmembers Smith, Christensen, Gibbs, Holliday, Allred, O'Neal, Morrison and Cowan. Also present were City Administrator Lane Danielzuk, City Clerk Kathy Welfl and City Attorney Jim Ellison. Notice of the meeting was given in advance by publication in the Gering Citizen, the designated method of giving notice. All proceedings hereafter were taken while the meeting was open to the attendance of the public except as otherwise indicated.

CALL TO ORDER

Mayor Kaufman called the meeting to order at 6:00 p.m. The Mayor noted that there was a quorum of the Council and City business could be conducted.

BIDS:

1. Fairway Mower bid - Parks & Recreation Department

Ron Ernst, Parks and Recreation Director, stated this is for a fairway unit to be used at the golf course. The bids are off the State of Nebraska bids with the Toro Company. There are two bids, staff recommends accepting the lower bid of \$52,157.50 for a 2015 demo unit with 44 hours. Councilmember Allred asked if the demo unit would still include new factory warranty. Mr. Ernst replied yes. Councilmember Christensen said he's somewhat concerned; it seems to him that we buy a lot of mowers for the Park Department. Mr. Ernst said between the golf, cemetery and parks we do buy about one mower per year. Councilmember Christensen asked if this would bring us up to date so we don't have to look at buying a mower again next year. Mr. Ernst said it will bring us up to date at the golf course.

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Councilmember Christensen said this is probably something we should have looked at at budget time, but it seems to him that we buy a lot of lawn mowers. Mr. Ernst stated that this one is replacing the 2001; we had that one a long time.

Councilmember Smith said if any of the Council Members would like to, we've taken a tour; Ron can take you around. We have a lot of grass to mow; if you look around there are big parks. He said he's surprised it's only one mower per year we're replacing; he'd think it was more like two or three.

Councilmember Gibbs asked Mr. Ernst if we're still contractually doing the grounds keeping for the schools too. Mr. Ernst replied yes. Councilmember Gibbs stated that's a lot more involved too. Mayor Kaufman added that this expenditure was approved during the budget process.

Motion by Councilmember Allred to approve the staff recommendation for the Fairway Mower bid in the amount of \$52,157.50 from the Nebraska State Bid for a Toro 5010h, 2015 Demo model. Second by Councilmember O'Neal. There was no discussion. The Mayor called the vote. "AYES": Smith, Christensen, Gibbs, Holliday, Allred, O'Neal, Morrison, Cowan. "NAYS": None. Abstaining: None. Absent: None. Motion Carried.

3. Gering Public Library Report for FY 2014/15 by Library President, Suzanne Myers

Suzanne Myers, Library Board President, presented the Annual Library Report to the Mayor and Council.

Mrs. Myers stated: We have two newly appointed board members, Dr. Alan Johnson and Kerri Schnase-Berge. They, along with Tracy Henderson, board vice-president, Hugh Dunne and myself are proud to work with our community to assure that we have the best possible library and library services.

The staff under the leadership of Diane Downer, library director, has a total of almost fifty years of service with the City. Community support has included volunteers, The Friends of the Library, CoderDojo volunteers, community members of a strategic plan committee, the partnership with Lied Scottsbluff Public Library as well as financial contributions from memorials and from Runza. *We know the importance of encouraging literary experiences and have several programs that focus on that goal.*

Summer Reading Program "Every Hero Has a Story" "Unmask" and "Escape the Ordinary"

- Adults (*children at heart*) read 1067 books over the summer
- 452 youth
 - 77 teens (7th thru High School)
 - 345 children (Preschool thru 6th grade)

Looking to the Future

- *Each of you was presented with a binder that included a history of the library including consultations since 2009 about the possible expansion or building of a new library.*
- *The survey that was completed in 2012 highlighted the desire of the community at that time to have the library in the downtown area which would be within walking distance of most if not all of the schools.*
- *The library board and city staff have considered several possible locations during the past six, almost seven years and have found one that we currently think would be best. Legion Park is near downtown and we have found other libraries that are in parks are very successful while still allowing for “park” activities. I visited with the late Charles Fenster who reminded me that that park had a sewer line and restrooms that were in need of replacement and we chatted that IF a library was added to the park it would be a good time to complete those projects. You have an aerial view of the park and a proposed footprint a library would have. It would not necessarily be in that location. With the approval of the downtown plaza I think there might no longer be a need for the band shelter.*
- *A feasibility study has been approved by the council and will take place this year to determine how the library can best serve the community.*

Councilmember Christensen noted that circulation was down 10,000; he hopes that isn't a sign that less people are using the library. Mrs. Myers stated that they are using a different method for counting things; they're not sure they've been real accurate with the new system of counting. Trends also show that this number goes up and down over the years. They have noticed that their online circulation has increased in the last few years. (Note *Correction below).

* **Correction:** Following the March 14, 2016 Gering City Council meeting, Library Director, Diane Downer, noted the following correction in the Library Annual Report: The numbers entered into the Public Library Survey were for print only and did not include audio or video materials. Total circulation for adult materials is 44,036 and for children's materials it is 18,367, which brings the total to 62,403. Circulation is down 2,945, not 10,000 as we discussed at the March 14 Council meeting.

Mrs. Myers also noted that the library hours have changed; they open at 9:00 a.m. now.

Motion by Councilmember Smith to file for public record the Annual Gering Public Library Report. Second by Councilmember Morrison. There was no discussion. 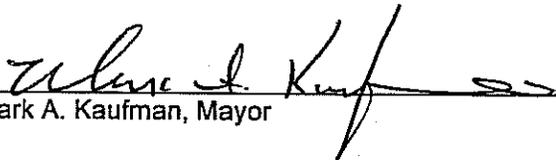
