Storytime is Back September 16th

Hooray! Storytime is coming back to the Gering Library!

Because of the current health measures, things will be slightly different in youth services this fall at GPL, but we are striving to provide the most services that we can while maintaining safety and following the directed health measures from the state.

Consequently, storytime will begin in mid-September but with a few changes. There will be one

weekly storytime every Wednesday at 10:00 a.m. for infants, toddlers, and preschoolers. There will be no inside playtime or crafts this fall. We are going to have storytime in Legion Park during September and possibly longer if the weather holds out so children can play in the park after storytime.

In the case of inclement weather and when it becomes too cold, we will hold storytime in our Community Room with appropriate social distancing.

Storytime will begin on September 16th.

Other changes include suspension of Lego Club and LEAP for the fall with the hope of starting back up again during the winter if community health conditions improve. Finally, masks are highly recommended but not required.


The Count begins his imprisonment as a guest, then segues into

A Message for Parents & Students:

Students are headed back to school, but it is far from business as usual. Libraries are in the same boat.

Because of some restrictions in place due to COVID-19, the library will not be available as a waiting spot for students after school.

As much as we hate to say it, we wanted to let everyone know so that no one is caught by surprise. One thing that's hard to come by is solid information, so when we had solid news, even though it's not good news, we felt like sharing was the right thing to do.

We also wanted to reassure everyone that this is not an announcement we're making because kids and teens are an anticipated problem. Some of our favorite patrons practically grew up in the library, and we've loved seeing shared art pieces, group projects coming together, and friendships forming. Nearly all of our after-school visitors have been polite and

respectful, and few patrons make a bigger impact on the library. The library is a lively, vibrant place when they're around.

That said, the library is not a good place to wait for a ride from a parent or guardian, or for any extended period of time during the day or after school.

Here are some rules that are currently in place that will impact those who use the library. Please know that these rules apply in our entire building, including the lobby.

For patrons who aren't parents or students:

The library will be busier after school. We suggest using the library before school gets out or after 5:00 on weekdays.

1 Hour time limit: We are encouraging everyone to use the library in a grab-and-go style, and we would prefer visits be as quick as possible. That said, we are limiting stays to one hour because we are operating with tight occupancy

limits. We may move to a one in and one out system if our capacity reaches 25 patrons.

1 person per computer: This will be strictly enforced.

Masks: Masks, properly worn to cover the nose and mouth are strongly suggested for patrons over 10 years old when closer than 6 feet to others.

Food and drinks: No food or drinks in the library. The water fountains will not be available for use.

Children under 8: It has always been and will continue to be library policy that children under 8 are not permitted to be in the library without a responsible parent or caregiver who is at least age 13. This may be more strictly enforced than it has been in the past.

Reduced offerings: Numbers of available computers have been reduced due to spacing needs, and patrons may be asked to wait for a computer during busy

times so we can keep folks a safe distance apart.

We understand the challenges and demands of living under these circumstances.

As a library, we're used to filling gaps in the community and we hate saying "No." In this case we've decided that being honest is the best thing we can do for Gering.

We've been happy to see so many of you after school, and we will miss Lego Club as much as you. We hope to see a future where things return to normal and the library is once again a good place to hang out after school.

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
